Auction Process

Still doing:

*food – will be on a flow starting when the program starts

Not doing:

- *raffle
- *silent action
- *ribbon judging

Volunteers needed:

- *(2-3) for signing in member & tagging plants & ensuring they are placed on the table in numerical order
- *(1) bidder sign-in
- *(1-2) auctioneer
- *(2-3) plant sales tag tracking (maintaining the list of winning bidders & bids)
- *(1) for bidder board tracking
- *(1) with bidder board just to write winning # & amount on tag and tracking sheet
- *(2) plant presenters (Vanna White)
- *(2-3) cashing out

Numbering process:

*Just as we do in the live auction, two tags per plant. One tag stays w/plant, other tag is pinned to bidder board once auctioned off. Winning bidder number and bid amount is written on each tag *if there is to be a reserve, the reserve needs to be CLEARLY MARKED on the plant tag. If it is not clearly marked the plant will be treated as no reserve

Process:

- *member checks in & provides name/phone number & is assigned 4 number tags (one number per auction item, a total of 4 items allowed)
- *plants and/or items are placed on preview table
- *once plant or item is auctioned, the winning bid amount is written on both tags.
- *one tag stays w/plant or item, other tag is pinned to the corresponding bidder number on bidder board (card board w/push pins)
- *the plant is then handed to the winning bidder.
- *the winning bid amount is written on the master sign in sheet by the seller's name
- *upon completion, bidder proceeds to bidder board to collect pant slips/tags
- *then bidder proceeds to cashier table where someone adds on calculator with tape and passes on to cashiers to take payment
- * form to be printed with bidder #, room for PAID checkmark, and room for cashier initials to take to plant table where that person counts plants set aside for them to verify payment. Also should be ___ number of plants won NOTE this can be used at general auction as well.

Room flow:

On right side as you come in the door

- *Membership is the first stop to confirm person with plants/items is a member
- *bidder number assignment is next
- *then assigning plant numbers
- *plant tables are on the same side of the room as the food.
- *as soon as the plant is signed in, it is placed on the plants for auction table closest to the auctioneer podium as possible -IN NUMERICAL ORDER
- *bidder board goes to the right of the auctioneer

Upon conclusion of the auction the bidder board with one person is moved to the cashier table for handing out tags to winning bidders. We will need a volunteer to man the board & hand out tickets.

Cashing out process:

- *cashiers confirm on calc tape amounts for plants (to verify plant info is captured correctly)
- *cashiers process payment and keeps all tags
- *cashiers match bids on slips to calculator tape (to verify plant info is captured correctly)
- *cashiers process payment and keeps all slips stapled or paper clipped to calculator tape
- * cashier then gives Paid form to bidder to pick up plants they won. Volunteer checks number of plants won by number of actual plants held and gives to bidder.
- * If bidder wants to leave before auction is over, they should go to bidder board, collect their slips and go to check out table just like regular auction. Volunteer adds up slips and cashier takes payment and gives the bidder the paid form so they can pick up their plants as stated.

How to Fertilize Using Mesh Bags Text and photograph by Karla Velasco


THE WAY I grow orchids has evolved tremendously over the years. It can be impacted by our location, access to supplies, and our level of effort. I have grown orchids in Florida, South Korea, Texas, and now Phoenix. With each new location, my growing strategies have evolved.

Orchids grown in baskets or mounted have been hard for me to fertilize. I use sheer mesh bags that sell as party favors or jewelry bags. I fill these up with slow-release fertilizer, and Bonide granules (contains imidacloprid, which affects honey bees and is banned in several northeastern states, Puerto Rico and Canada). They are then placed on my orchids. These bags are inexpensive. A pack of 100 is easily found online for under \$10.

I found fertilizer baskets not to be as effective as these mesh bags. The basket's holes are too big to hold the granules and the baskets hold very little fertilizer. The drawstring of the mesh bags makes them easy to close and hang. The material is flexible and if roots creep into the bag, they can be easily cut apart. These bags have certainly made a difference in my growing.

If you experiment with these bags or have other ideas regarding how they may be used, I would love to hear about it.

HOME REMEDIES

- Rather than expensive and potentially dangerous herbicides, spray full-strength vinegar to kill weeds between pavers and on greenhouse floors. (Do not spray on orchids.)
- Aspirin (just % of one 325 mg tablet per gallon of water) helps protect plants from fungal and viral pathogens when used as a spray. More is NOT better. Do not exceed this amount.
- Homemade insecticide (mix in a 1 gallon [3.8 L] jug): 1 pint (0.5 L) rubbing alcohol, 1 pint (0.5 L) 409 spray cleaner, and 3 quarts (2.8 L) water. Apply as a spray.
- Isopropyl (rubbing) alcohol can be put into an empty spray bottle and used to treat scale, mealybugs, thrips, aphids, red spider mites and perhaps other pests. It works only while wet and must contact the insect. Avoid contact
 - —Neosporin has been reportedly used to treat orchid crown rot; remove rotted area of plant before treatment.
